Tour Book 1982:

Today one of Danville's most imposing classically inspired mansions, 904 Main Street was constructed originally as an Italianate-style house on the eve of the Civil War. Built for local merchant E.J. Bell in 1860, the house then featured windows with round and arched hoods characteristic of the mid-century Italianate style, vestiges of which are most evident in the two-story bay window facing Chestnut Place and the tall brackets at the rear eaves of the house. The

photograph above from the 1880s or '90s shows members of the John R. Pace family in front of the house as it looked during its first 50 years.

Bell and his family lived here until his bankruptcy in 1868. In 1869 his house and lot were purchased at auction by William J. Peake, a New York City resident who sold the property the following year to Mr. and Mrs. John R. Pace. Pace, a tobacconist, his wife Sallie, and their six children lived here over twenty years. Four years after the death of Mr. Pace in 1893, his administrator sold the house at auction to H. Lee Boatwright, a rising young tobacco executive, who with his growing family moved here from their first house at 136 Chestnut Street. In 1911, the Boatwrights had W.R. Deitrick, a local contractor, remodel and modernize the house extensively, making it more suitable for entertaining foreign tobacconists and political figures who were their frequent house guests. The embellishments which so completely altered the appearance of the 50-year-old house reflected the new trend toward Beaux Arts classicism -- Palladian windows and doors with beveled glass, and a massive two-story Ionic portico intersected by a one-story Ionic colonnade.

In 1967, five years before her death, a daughter, Alice Boatwright Williamson, the last family member to reside here, conveyed the house to Judge and Mrs. A.M. Aiken. Archibald Murphey Aiken, Jr., was Judge of the Corporation Court of Danville from 1950 until his death in 1971. His wife, the former Mary Mickley, continued to live in the house until 1979, when she sold it to Dr. and Mrs. Malcolm J. Mallery.

The Mallerys, who occupy the spacious second floor apartment created by Mrs. Williamson in the 1950s, are still in the process of completing a phased rehabilitation of the structure, with eventual plans to unite a portion of the downstairs with their second-floor rooms. Much of their work up to now has involved repairs to the roof, soffiting, modillions, and to the imposing columns to ensure their longevity. Dr. and Mrs. Mallery have also

found time for restoration inside, notably the stripping of as many as thirteen layers of paint from some of the deeply-molded woodwork and doors, giving them instead a warm natural finish.

The entire house, which includes three apartments and the carriage house, 22 rooms in all, is open for the tour.

Tour Book 1993:

Built as an Italianate-style home in 1860, this mansion is most recognized today for the elegant face-lift added 50 years later by H. Lee Boatwright, a rising young tobacco executive at Dibrell Brothers, Inc. These alterations reflect the popular turn-of-the-century trend toward Beaux Arts classicism. Just before the War Between the States, local merchant E.J. Bell had the original home built with semi-circular and arched windows still notable today on its Chestnut Place facade.

The Bell family lived here until Mr. Bell's bankruptcy in 1868. At an auction sale, the home was purchased by William J. Peake, a resident of New York, who soon sold the property to Mr. and Mrs. John R. Pace, who lived here for twenty years with their six children. After Pace's death, Mr. Boatwright purchased the home in 1893 and moved from his previous residence at 136 Chestnut Street to this mansion, which he made eminently more suitable for entertaining foreign tobacconists and political figures of the day. Mr. Boatwright engaged W.R. Deitrick, local contractor, to remodel the exterior extensively by adding Palladian windows and doors with beveled glass and a two-story lonic portico intersected by a one-story lonic colonnade.

In 1967, Alice Boatwright Williamson, a daughter, conveyed the home to Judge and Mrs. Archibald Murphey Aiken. Aiken was judge of the Corporation Court from 1950 until his death in 1971. His widow lived in the home until 1979 when she conveyed the property to Dr. Malcolm Mallery. Dr. Mallery occupied the second floor apartment created by Boatwright's daughter in the 1950s as be began an extensive rehabilitation to stabilize the home. In 1986, with love at first sight, Robert and Anne Banks purchased the home and began to unravel the years of 'remuddling' to recreate a private home in the mansion of 6,500 square feet and six full baths.

The Brights, local decorators, purchased the property in 1991, and have continued to adapt most of the home for their family's use while maintaining two desirable apartments and the carriage house for tenant use. The floor plan now flows with the removal of partitions and the relocation of a spectacular new kitchen on the ground level in the area used originally as a servant kitchen and smokehouse. The wall colors are a rich palette of traditional, but fresh shades, creating a gracious environment for the elegant furnishings, including antiques and elements available to the trade. The classical interior columns and detailed dentil moldings are inspiring reminders of the lifestyles of early Danville's rich and famous occupants of Millionaires' Row. In the formal dining room the Palladian window with beveled glass lends a light, airy feeling reminiscent of a garden setting.

Tour Book 2011:

Recognized today for its monumental two-story columned portico, it's hard to believe that this elegant, century-old face-lift covers a simple Italianate I-house -- built on the eve of the Civil War. Some 50 years later, a rising young tobacco executive recreated the dwelling to reflect his aspirations at the tobacco brokerage firm Dibrell Brothers. Just around the corner, on Chestnut Place, in contrast to this classical facade of beaux arts inspiration, are semi-circular and arched windows, and heavy brackets typical of the original 1860 house built for local merchant E.J. Bell.

The family lived here until Mr. Bell's bankruptcy in 1868. Then, at auction, the dwelling was purchased by a resident of New York, William J. Peake. He soon sold the property to tobacconist John R. Pace, and his wife, who lived here for two decades with their six children. After Pace's death, Mr. Boatwright purchased the home in 1893 and moved from his previous residence at 136 Chestnut Street to this mansion, which he made eminently more suitable for entertaining foreign tobacconists and political figures of the day. Mr. Boatwright engaged W.R. Deitrick, a local contractor, to remodel the exterior extensively by adding Palladian windows, and doors with beveled glass, plus a two-story lonic portico intersected by a one-story lonic colonnade.

In 1967, Alice B. Williamson, conveyed her home to Judge and Mrs. Archibald Murphy Aiken. Aiken was Judge of the Corporation Court from 1950 until his death in 1971. His widow lived here until 1979 when she conveyed the property to Dr. Malcolm Mallery. Dr. Mallery occupied the second-floor apartment created by Boatwright's daughter in the 1950s as he began an extensive rehabilitation. Thereafter, from 1986 to 2009, the process of removing apartments and returning the house, by degrees, to its origins as a single-family dwelling continued under a succession of owners -- Bob and Anne Banks, Danny and Carolyn Bright, Ed and Suzanne Stowe, and Rod Tomlinson and Maria Mejias.

Two years ago, Jonathan and Ginger Holbrook, who moved to Danville from North Carolina, purchased the rambling house and began their own campaign to bring out the luster of rooms with rich details, like classical interior columns set off by dentil crown moldings, and Palladian-style windows with sparkling beveled glass. With a half-dozen children on the "maintenance crew," the Holbrooks are busy stewards inside and out at this grand old mansion.

The Queen Anne style house of Mr. and Mrs. French Conway occupies a choice location, dominated by an ancient oak tree that remains from a grove of nearly two acres originally, a grove that in the 1820s contained the early home of James Lanier, Danville's first mayor. Later, in 1857, A.G. Buford built in this grove his mansion, as well as a small brick school or office under the oak where the house at 912 Main Street now stands. Mr. Buford divided and sold his property in 1882, the larger, upper portion going to a banker, J.R. Jopling, and the smaller, lower parcel with the small brick office and the oak to the J.R. Pace family, who owned the house at 904 Main Street next door. When the Pace home and adjoining lot were auctioned in 1897, Maggie Cherry was the high bidder for the 40-foot lot that is site of this house. She and her husband, W.A. Cherry, had their Queen Anne clapboard dwelling with second floor bays, shingled gables, and a delicate Ionic front porch constructed In 1898.

In 1905 the Cherrys sold the house to J. Pemberton Penn, a tobacconist with Pemberton and Penn, a leaf commission business founded by his father, James G. Penn. Central heating was among the many improvements to the house added by the Penns. Often the house is referred to as the old Hall place, owing to the long ownership of the property by Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Hall. The Halls lived here 45 years before the house was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Conway in 1962.

In adapting the house for their needs, the Conways have retained all the original features of the facade, including the beautiful leaded windows that give the entrance special interest. In remodeling their home, including extensive additions to the rear, the Conways incorporated architectural details salvaged from the old Rison house, which stood at 1002 Main Street, the site of the present Wednesday Club.

Tour Book 1994:

An ancient oak, remnant of an original grove of nearly two acres, shades the Queen Anne house built in 1898 for W.A. and Maggie Cherry on land once owned by Captain James Lanier, Danville's first mayor. The two-and-a-half story clapboard dwelling still features the original second floor bay, shingled gables, and the delicate Ionic front porch that has welcomed guests through its leaded glass entryway for nearly a century.

In 1905, J. Pemberton Penn, son of the builder of 862 Main Street, purchased the home and added a central heating system. In 1917, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Hall took title to the property, where they remained for 45 years before selling to the Conways in 1962. Mrs. Conway, a local ASID decorator, has been sensitive to the original features in adapting the home with extensive additions to the rear. Architectural details salvaged from the old Rison home, which stood at 1002 Main Street prior to the present Wednesday Club, have been incorporated into their renovations.

Built in 1890, this elaborate dwelling is the successor to two earlier houses on this site. One was an early home, c 1829, of Capt. James Lanier, the town's first mayor. After this structure burned, Col. Algernon Sidney Buford had his new house and stables built here in the late 1850s. Also on the two-acre grove he had constructed a school or office said to have stood beneath the oak which dominates the adjacent front yard at 912 Main Street. In 1882 Buford, an early detractor of the Richmond and Danville Railroad who later served twenty years as its president, subdivided his Main Street property. L.R. Jopling bought the Buford home, had it razed, and the present structure built. Its irregular plan, various projections and story heights are unified by repetitions of window openings and architectural motifs. Central to the design is the three-story square domed tower of French Renaissance inspiration. The intricate stone and staggered brick motif of the segmented arched openings harmonizes with the delicately patterned cast iron entrance porch.

James Rufus Jopling, who had this excellent example of a Second Empire style house built, was a native of Bedford County. A Confederate veteran, he moved to Lynchburg after the War and married Mollie Phelps. In 1874 he came to Danville as a partner in the expanding Lynchburg hardware firm of Jones & Watts. In Danville he also entered banking and was the president of the Planters National Bank, now First and Merchants National, from 1898 until his death in 1913.

In 1928 the Jopling heirs sold the house to Allen E. Anderson, who conveyed it the following year to Charles Branch Clements and his wife Lydia McCormick Clements, both Halifax County natives. Clements had come to Danville in 1905 and began work with the furniture company that eventually bore his name -- Clements & Parker. After his death in 1972, the house passed to his son, Hugh T. Clements, who with two of his children, continues to reside here. Inside, high-ceilinged rooms with ornamental plaster are complemented by elaborate slate mantles decorated to resemble marble and other opulent materials.

Some twenty years later the Missionary Society of the Synod of North Carolina sent to Danville the Rev. Mr. William S. Plummer (of New Jersey) as a first step in establishing a local church. Shortly thereafter two visiting ministers held a series of meetings, culminating on New Year's Eve, 1826, with what may have been the first communion service in Danville. On May 19 of the following year, the Presbytery of Orange

(North Carolina) met in Danville to ordain the Rev. Mr. Plummer, who served as the first pastor of the congregation that then numbered thirty-four.

Early worshippers met at the Danville Academy building on the corner of Jefferson Avenue and Loyal Street. In 1828 a church was built on a Jefferson Avenue lot facing the spot where Patton Street later intersected. This frame building was replaced a quarter of a century later by a more substantial building, and then with a third building on this site in 1879 -- a large Victorian Gothic Revival structure of stucco over brick, which served the congregation until 1910, when it was sold to the First Christian Church, whose members continue to worship there.

Two years earlier the Men's Brotherhood of the church had recommended the purchase of a lot where a new church and manse could be built. A lot on Main Street at Sutherlin Avenue was chosen. The building committee selected Mr. R.H. Hunt of Chattanooga, Tennessee, as the architect, and Harwood and Moss of Newport News, Virginia, as the contracting firm. The completed church was dedicated September 8, 1912.

The building is an important example of a dignified Neo-Classical Revival structure built in the form of a Roman temple. Its front displays a monumental hexastyle Ionic portico. The classical flavor of the building is emphasized by the use of light-colored pressed brick walls. An accomplished local tile and plaster contractor, Charles Orchard, completed some of the building's interior details.

Since the completion of the original church, the congregation has added a Sunday School building, a memorial chapel, and an administrative and educational wing. During this last phase of growth in 1961, the church sanctuary was remodeled and a Schlicker baroque-type organ was added.

Tour Book 2003:

Just behind the sanctuary is a memorial chapel of traditional design in the spirit of the 18th century, added a half-century ago by the Danville architect William W. Patterson.

Tour Book 2014:

The last of Danville's historic "first" churches built along Millionaires Row between Reconstruction and World War I, this

commanding edifice takes the monumental form of a Roman temple. It was built in 1911 by area Presbyterians who were the first congregation of any denomination to organize locally - on New Year's Eve, 1826.

The last of these buildings, dating from 1879, was long used by the congregation of the First Christian Church, which purchased it in 1910 prior to First Presbyterian's move to Main Street.

For their present edifice, the congregation chose the noted architect Reuben H. Hunt of Chattanooga, Tennessee. A six-columned Ionic portico dominates his Neoclassical design, emphasized by light-colored pressed brick laid up under the direction of the Newport News, Virginia contracting firm Harwood and Moss. Charles Orchard, the city's master plaster craftsman of the day, executed the handsome ceiling moldings.

Dedicated September 8, 1912, the church remains today a sophisticated example of Neoclassical Revival design, recalling the six-column Roman temple form favored by Thomas Jefferson for Virginia's State Capital.

In 1960, the interior of the original 1912 church was modified when the chancel was divided and the present pews installed, along with a Schlicker baroque-type organ. Added also during this period, just behind the sanctuary, is a memorial chapel of traditional design - an homage to the spirit of the 18th century by the Danville architect William W. Patterson.

Among the finest High Victorian Italianate mansions in the state, this house was built in 1884 for John Harrell Schoolfield, one of three brothers who left the Horsepasture community in Henry County and came to Danville at various times in the 1870s and '80s. With T.B. Fitzgerald, B.F. Jefferson, and Dr. H.W. Cole, these brothers -- John, James, and Addison -- founded the Riverside Cotton Mills, now Dan River, Inc.

John Schoolfield had a fellow mill founder, Thomas B. Fitzgerald, who was also a leading contractor and brick manufacturer, build his house, noted for its projecting bays and the broad linear outline of its bracketed cornice. The cast iron of the front and side porches with their turned columns, delicate cresting and railing silhouetted against the light-painted brick walls is exceptional. Tall, narrow windows throughout the house are accented by carved stone hood molds, and the interlocking brickwork in the edges of the octagonal-ended projections is an interesting motif.

The Schoolfield brothers married three sisters, daughters of Capt. and Mrs. Harrison Carter France of Patrick County. John married Susan France, and her mother Katherine Penn France spent her last years in this house, where she died in 1914 at the age of 96.

During the Schoolfield years, the home was the center for much entertaining. Most notably, the brilliant and delightful reception given in honor of John H. Schoolfield, Jr., and his bride, the former Frank Hanes, daughter of the Winston-Salem knitting mill owner, Pleasant Henderson Hanes. One descendant of this marriage, Mrs. Matt P. Jordan, still resides in Danville today.

John Schoolfield died at the age of 82 during an influenza epidemic of 1920. His widow continued to live here until her death, after which the house descended to their daughter, Mrs. Daisy Keen. Mrs. Keen sold the house to Dr. Walter McMann in 1939, and from then until 1976, the Montreal, Canada-native maintained his medical offices here, where he and his family also resided until 1960. During this period Danville's famed naturalist, Johnnie Westbrook, maintained his nature museum in the basement. In 1960 the house was sold to Mr. and Mrs. R.M. Compson. During their sixteen years here the Compsons did much to refurbish the house and grounds to their earlier elegance.

Since 1976 the house has been the residence of Dr. and Mrs. William S. Ogden, Jr. They and their active children make full use of the house which William B. O'Neal describes in his 1967 book, Architecture in Virginia, as having been built with "enough rooms in it for every member of the [John H. Schoolfield] family to have a separate sitting room."

For over 65 years, members of the Harvie family lived in this Victorian-era dwelling built in 1873 for Dr. Lewis Edwin Harvie. This VMI First classman, called to drill recruits for the Confederacy,

was captured at Gettysburg and held prisoner for two years. In 1871, after obtaining his medical degree from the Medical College of Virginia, Dr. Harvie left his native Powhatan County to establish his medical practice in Danville -- at the urging of a cousin who had relocated here as well.

Dr. Harvie's two-story dwelling accommodated not only family living quarters, but also his medical offices on the left side of the basement. Here he maintained his practice for 45 years. After his death in 1918, his widow, the former Martha Rutherfoord, continued to reside here until her death in 1936. Mrs. Harvie's will authorized John B. Harvie, one of the couple's ten children, to sell the property; in 1938 it was purchased by Sue Nora Moseley, the next-door neighbor at 968 Main Street. Thereafter, at least some members of the Harvie family remained here until 1941, when Mrs. Moseley sold the house -- minus a portion of the original 100-foot lot -- to George R. Norris. Norris, a native of South Carolina, retained one of the city's premier architects, J. Bryant Heard, to give the mid-Victorian, I-house a serene Neo-classical Revival "make-over," adding rear and sidewings for a total of 17 rooms. Richmond landscape architect Kenneth Higgins, a protege of landscape master Charles Gillette, designed the azalea-boxwood rear garden. The house remained in the family for nearly three decades, until Mr. Norris' death. In 1970 the couple's only child Grace Litzenberg conveyed the property to the present owner, Bill Haynesworth.

The Haynesworths are well known in the community for their family business OfficePlus, formerly Haynesworth's. Currently, Bill Haynesworth's residence is being offered for sale, in expectation of continuing the 135-plus-year stewardship tradition evidenced by a succession of caring owners. Descendant of those owners reside in the community today -- notably, Edwin J. Harvie, Jr., like his grandfather and namesake, a respected Danville M.D.; and Grace Norris Litzenberg, daughter of George and Elizabeth Rucker Norris who refurbished the house on the eve of the Second World War. Another result of that careful renovation was the charming garden gazebo adapted from the side porch columns formerly on the Moseley-Wiseman house next door.

Nearly 130 years after it was completed at the western edge of town, the Sutherlin Mansion continues to impress and intrigue today as it did passersby and visitors in antebellum Danville.

At age 36, when with his family he moved into his new and fashionable Italian-Villa-style dwelling in 1858, William T. Sutherlin had already served as an alderman and mayor, and had gained the respect of his colleagues as a leading banker, tobacconist and entrepreneur. Small wonder then that his move from Wilson Street to Main foreshadowed a general shift of Danville's leading families to Main and nearby streets, especially after the War Between the States.

During the War, William Sutherlin was appointed quartermaster for the area and achieved the rank of major. After the War he served as president of the Virginia State Board of Agriculture, and advanced the cause of higher education and Danville's interests as a Delegate in the General Assembly.

His house too received acclaim near the close of the War when Maj. and Mrs. Sutherlin received Confederate President Jefferson Davis as their guest following the fall of Richmond. He and his cabinet remained in Danville from April 3 until April 10 [1865] when they learned of Lee's surrender at Appomattox. At this house President Davis signed his last proclamation to the Confederate citizens. On account of its historical associations the structure is known as the "Last Capitol of the Confederacy.- Registered today as a Virginia Historic Landmark, the structure possesses all the hallmarks of the Italian Villa style: a shallow hipped roof, bracketed cornice, smooth stuccoed walls, hood moldings, and a square cupola.

It remains the architectural focal point for Danville's gracious Main Street due largely to a group of early historic preservationists who, in 1913, organized the Danville Confederate Memorial Association to raise funds to purchase the property to prevent its being subdivided and sold to speculators to settle the estate of Mrs. Sutherlin who had died in 1911. For its part in helping save the building the Anne Eliza Johns Chapter, UDC [United Daughters of the Confederacy], retains second-floor quarters in the building "in perpetuity."

In 1928 work commenced to convert the dwelling to Danville's Public Library, which remained in the building for some 45 years. In 1973 the library relocated to its present downtown location and the Danville Chapter of the Virginia Museum petitioned City Council for use of the historic

shrine as a museum of history and art for the community. Now designated as the Danville Museum of Fine Arts and History, the mansion and its original rooms have been lovingly

One hundred years later the vision of Miss Augusta Yates and eleven friends continues to thrive at the Wednesday Club at the corner of Main at Holbrook Streets. Originally, the members met in private homes to share programs, which have expanded over the years to include lecturers, artists, and notable persons for its current membership of over 600 local women. The mission of this group sets out to enrich the lives of its members, raise the standards of local culture, and provide service to the community.

Civic endeavors have significantly broadened the horizons of its membership and as early as 1902, its social consciousness led to an investigation of the sanitary conditions of Danville's public school system. During both World Wars, the members volunteered to provide services such as open houses for soldiers passing through Danville and acted as hostesses for USO activities. As the group grew in number, the Wednesday Club purchased its first home in 1922 at 1002 Main Street, now the site of the present Georgian-Revival brick building, which was erected in 1970.

In 1927, the Club established a Crippled Children's Clinic to provide relief free or at nominal cost to sufferers in need of orthopedic services. The Club instigated the awareness that Danville needed a public library with an early committee effort. These efforts did not succeed immediately but provided the impetus later developed by the Danville Library Association and involved many members who were instrumental in the eventual creation of the city's first public library.

The Club is exemplified by the words of Mrs. Walter Paxton, a charter member and former president: "With a purpose larger than accomplishments, we are working not only for today but for tomorrow ... not merely for ourselves, but for those who are to follow after us. We are organized not to do little things but to do big things and the possibilities of our service are only limited by our strength and our means ... a union of force, with the one definite and earnest aim

of extending that knowledge which tends toward greater happiness, better citizenship, life more abundant and finer living."

Tour Book 2010:

No doubt, Miss Augusta Yates and her colleagues -- who in 1893 met in the home of her sister Mary Ella Aiken at 215 West Main Street to organize what would become The Wednesday Club -- would be amazed at their legacy. Over 115 years later, their inaugural vision of civic outreach and self improvement, based at the corner of Main at Holbrook Street for nesarly 90 years, continues to thrive. What began as members sharing programs in private homes has expanded over the decades as guest lecturers, artists, and other notable persons, some of international acclaim, inspire a current membership of 484 local women.

As early as 1902, the group's social consciousness led to an investigation of the sanitary conditions of Danville's public schools. During both World Wars, club volunteers maintained open houses for soldiers passing through Danville, with members serving as hostesses for USO activities. As membership grew, The Wednesday Club purchased in 1922 its first clubhouse, a former Westbrook home at 1002 Main Street, now the site of the present Williamsburg-Revival brick building erected in 1970.

In 1927, the Club established a Crippled Children's Clinic, later the Samual Newman Clinic, for orthopedic services. Reflecting national momentum for the "public libraries movement" -- a cause shared by many Southern women's groups prior to the First World War -- The Wednesday Club helped sustain The Danville Library Association's goal to create the city's first free public library, which opened in the former Sutherlin Mansion on January 1, 1928.

The Wednesday Club continues to be guided by the words of an early president and charter member, Mrs. Walter Paxton: "With a purpose larger than accomplishments, we are working not only for today but for tomorrow ... not merely for ourselves, but for those who are to follow after us. We are organized not to do little things but to do big things ... limited [only) by our strength and our means ... a union of force [for) that knowledge which tends toward greater happiness, better citizenship, life more abundant and finer living."



Tour Boook 1993:

Built in 1897 for \$3,300, the home of T.S. Williamson sheltered this family until the heirs sold the home to Lois Mumford in 1986 soon after it was featured as the Society's first Decorator Showcase. One of four children of Elbert Madison Williamson and Virginia Spencer Williamson, Thomas Spencer Williamson moved to Danville from Petersburg at the age of eleven. As had his father, the younger Williamson entered the lucrative tobacco trade as an independent leaf dealer. Having served as the president of the Danville Tobacco Association and as an active promoter of the local market for more than 50 years, T.S. Williamson was often described as the 'dean' of the local tobacco industry.

T.S. Williamson & Company, which was begun by his father in 1878, operated for 74 years. Williamson first married Annie Hickey, the daughter of a tobacconist, in 1891 -- just years before purchasing this 57-foot lot on Main Street to build a 2-1/2 story Queen Anne mansion, which stands today unaltered. Rated as 'Notable" by Russell Wright's architectural inventory, the interesting facade is broken by a three-part projecting bay on the left and a conical roof tower on the right. Its unique face is enhanced by the Tuscan colonnade across the front which develops into a circular pavilion on the corner opposite the turret. The original servants' quarters are still located at the rear of the lot along Dibrell Alley.

In 1917, ten years after the death of his first wife, T.S. Williamson married Mary Dodson Richmond. He lived here with his new wife and three children from his first marriage until his death in 1945. The Williamson homeplace with its badly leaking roof was saved from impending doom by Lois Mumford. A new roof, updated wiring, new wall coverings, and TLC gave the majestic home a new lease on life.

In December 1992, the Barbours purchased the home with grand plans to complete the salvation started by Ms. Mumford. The kitchen area was totally gutted and replaced with designer cabinets, elegant wallpaper, and new floor coverings to create a delightful and airy space to welcome the morning. All of the oak flooring in the home was beautifully refinished and sealed to protect its refurbished look. The master suite was moved to its new location at the top of the rear staircase and the sleeping porch with antiquated bath became a new master bath and dressing room.

As the Barbours reach year one of a five-year restoration plan, they also have added a scalloped Victorian fence at the rear, started extensive landscaping, and installed central air. The impetus of their move from the West End to Millionaires' Row is to open as a bed & breakfast inn in 1994.

Tour Book 2014:

From the time of its construction in 1897 until the mid-1980s, the house at 1012 Main Street sheltered but one family - that of T.S. Williamson and his descendants. Thomas Spencer Williamson, one of four children of Elbert Madison Williamson and Virginia Spencer Williamson, moved to Danville from Petersburg at the age of eleven. Like his father, the younger Williamson

entered the lucrative tobacco trade as an independent leaf dealer. Years later, as the president of the Danville Tobacco Association and as an active promoter of the local market for more than 50 years, T.S. Williamson often was called the 'dean' of the local tobacco industry.

Begun by his father in 1878, T.S. Williamson & Company operated for 74 years. Williamson first married a tobacconist's daughter, Annie Hickey, in 1891. Six years after their marriage he purchased a 57-foot lot on Main Street where this two-and-a-half-story Queen Anne style mansion was built.

In 1917, ten years after the death of his first wife, Williamson married Mary Dodson Richmond. Here he lived with his second wife and three children from his first marriage until his death in 1945. The last family members to reside here were his widow, known affectionately to her friends as "Miss Dot," who died in 1983, and a son, (the Rev.) Elbert Williamson.

In 1986, soon after it was featured as the Danville Historical Society's first ever Decorator Showcase house, the old Williamson home place, was purchased by Lois Mumford. Looking past its by-then tired condition, she refurbished its spacious rooms as her home, giving it a new lease on life. Six years later Pamela and Jimmy Barbour purchased the dwelling and continued the restoration begun by Mrs. Mumford. The Barbours installed

a handsome new kitchen, new infrastructure such as air conditioning, as well as landscaping, especially in the rear yard, to accommodate their use of the house as a bed and breakfast inn. Newly redecorated, the Barbours' Gold Leaf Inn opened in 1994 and became a popular homeaway-from-home for many travelers and sightseers.

When the Barbours moved to Atlanta, Drs. Franklin and Dugan Maddux purchased the house in 1996. They gave it a new purpose as Gamewood Data Systems, the couple's Internet server business which had outgrown its space in their Pittsylvania County home. In fact, during their tenure, the original servant's house in the rear yard was outfitted with banks of concealed electronic systems to handle the majority of Gamewoods Internet users!

The Madduxes stripped exterior paint from this accessory building and the main house alike, reflashing, sealing, priming and then repainting in the quiet palette still seen today - a nod to late Victorian taste as well as echoing hues in Gamewood's corporate logo.

Newest owners of the property, Fran and Phillip Baughman, who purchased the house just over two years ago, already are tackling their project "to-do list." Their lovely premises reflect the fact already that the Baughmans take seriously their stewardship of this important piece of Danville's architectural and social history.

Resembling nothing so much as a giant wedding cake with wreaths, swags, and other classical decorations, this mansion stands today as an example of architecture in transition; its freewheeling Queen Anne form is bedecked with Classical Revival details. Typical 1890s Queen Anne features include the three-story corner tower and projecting bays. Its Classical embellishments, an architectural mode that became the rage after the turn of the century, include not only the bas-relief Adam-type decorations near the roofline and over the secondstory windows, but also the graceful lonic porch that curves around the base of the tower. Completed in 1902 by local contractor James Fitzgerald after a design by architects Frye and Chesterman of Lynchburg, Virginia, the two-and-a-half-story clapboard house remains to modern eyes a well-proportioned design of exceptional craftsmanship. It was a gift from James Gabriel Penn to his daughter Mary Katherine Penn and her husband of five years, Barnes R. Penn.

As a girl Mary Katherine Penn lived with her parents James G. and Sallie Penn two blocks down the hill in the elaborate Italianate mansion at 862 Main Street. Barnes Penn was one of eight sons of Greenville and Kate Rucker Penn who resided at 138 Holbrook Avenue. Both these families, and all the Danville Penns, came originally from Penn's Store in Patrick County. After their marriage in 1897, Mr. and Mrs. Barnes Penn first lived at 1031 Main Street and in this narrow American Picturesque style house, currently under restoration, their daughter Elizabeth was born. Upon completion of their house at 1020 Main -- originally painted yellow with white trim -- Elizabeth moved here from across the street where she lived for the next eighty-three years, first with her parents and later with her husband Everett E. Carter, whom she married in 1925. Mr. Carter, a native of Bluefield, West Virginia, and long associated with the Penn family's venerable tobacco business, Pemberton and Penn, also became a city councilman and served several terms as Danville's mayor before his death in 1960.

Since purchasing the house earlier this year, new owners Howard Casey, Jr., and Robert Gibson consider themselves fortunate, as only the second owners of the house, to have acquired a property that was never altered substantially. Although some major repairs to the structure are in the offing, the owners will not have to undo any earlier "remuddling," only ensure the preservation of the house and its fine interior. Modillioned crown molding, and Adam Revival ornaments on the woodwork, staircase and some mantels are among the interior details that reflect the more delicate, post-Victorian mode after the turn of the century. This Classical Revival influence is reinforced in the motifs in the stained-glass windows above the stairway landing and in the crystalline light of the leaded glass in the public rooms. Complementing this setting are several pieces of the Penn-Carter furniture, acquired recently from the Carter children. These pieces again occupy rooms where they stood for decades.

Tour Book 1993:

Rated as 'Excellent' by Russell Wright in his 1971 architectural inventory of Danville, this important Queen Anne dwelling is decorated like a wedding cake with swags, wreaths, and

ornaments that draw the eye to its Main Street facade. Commenced in 1902, it was indeed a wedding gift from the tobacconist, James Gabriel Penn, to his daughter, Mary Katherine, and her husband, Barnes R. Penn, after their 1897 marriage. Land book records of the city show a value of "\$6500 added for house.- The mansion remained in the Penn family and was occupied by Mrs. Elizabeth Penn Carter, only child of the original owners, until her death in 1985.

Contracted by James Henry Fitzgerald, the home was designed by Frye and Chesterman, architects of Lynchburg, Virginia. The fine craftsmanship of the home features a corner tower, projecting bays, and a graceful lonic front porch that curves around the tower. As an early exporter of the "Golden Leaf," James Gabriel Penn founded Pemberton & Penn, Inc. and became a well-known capitalist in various other business ventures. The Penn family members are remembered for their ambition and energy that contributed to the growth and trade of the city's wealth in the tobacco industry. Elizabeth, the last family member to enjoy the beauty of this home, was married on December 23,1925, in the lovely front parlor to Everett Carter, who continued in the leaf business and later served several terms as Danville's mayor.

Purchased from only an exterior preview in 1986, Robert 'Hoot' Gibson and Howard 'Buddy' Casey were the perfect new owners. They valued the home's history and architecture as they began a total restoration with heart and soul renewing the life of 1020 Main as the Bright Leaf House Bed & Breakfast. As "on the job" craftsmen, they restored windows, walls, stained and leaded glass, servant bells, plumbing, wiring, and finally a complete revival of the Classical facade by chemically removing 35 coats of paint to reveal incredible detailing in the ornamentation along the frieze of the upper story and porch. They also expanded a brick patio into an informal English garden with roses, azaleas, hydrangea, and Southern perennials and added an underground sprinkler system.

Due to distress in the airline industry in which they were both employed, they were forced to sell their dream and seek employment outside the area. As of October 1993, this vision is being perpetuated by its new owners: Sharon Carney and Gloria Newbery, who fell in love with the museum-quality evident to tour goers this afternoon. They have relocated from Northern Virginia to pursue their vision of 1020 Main as The Wedding Cake House, a catering facility with bed & breakfast accommodations.

Tour Book 1987:

Like the story of the ugly duckling who became a beautiful swan, so too the house at 1031 Main Street has been transformed in just a year from a sad candidate for the wreckers' ball to a shining example of Victoriana, decked out in authentic period colors.

Built as one of a pair of identical speculative houses by C.C. Dula, a prominent tobacconist, in 1896, the property was first the residence of another tobacconist, Barnes R. Penn, his wife the former Mary Katherine Penn, and their daughter Elizabeth. In June 1903 the Barnes Penn family moved to their new Queen Anne Classical style home which stands at 1020 Main across the street. For a number of years the property at 1031 Main was home first to the R.A. Arrington family, then to Mr. and Mrs. E.F. Scales. From the 1940s and into the 1970s it was the residence

of the Robert E. Turner family. By the time local preservationists got wind of the imminent threat of demolition in the summer of 1986, the Dula-Penn-Turner home had been vacant for several years, and was in dire need of repair to its roof, porch and foundation, owning to many seasons of poor maintenance and neglect. Hope Harbor, next door, which had purchased the property at auction, was not in a position to rehabilitate the structure which, although architecturally unique, had become an eyesore.

Diligent efforts by an ad-hoc committee of the Danville Historical Society began the process that stayed the demolition of the house and led eventually to its sale and current restoration. In an attempt to combat the impression that the house was a lost cause, Society volunteers met numerous times in the fall of1986 to clean up the property, stabilize the structure, and rehabilitate it enough to find a purchaser. Repairing a gaping hole in the roof, placing supports under the sagging front porch, and hauling away truckloads of debris were just a few of the myriad tasks that took hundreds of man (and woman) hours. Many of the materials and much of the labor to stabilize and repair the structure was donated by area businesses, including Commonwealth Silver, Danville Lumber Company, Danville Paint and Supply, Kwik Copy, Moss Home Improvement Company, Inc., Pugh Roofing Company, Saunders Building Supply, and Wickes Lumber Company. Young preservationists, members of the Boy Scout Troop 356, also helped clean the premises.

Only one classified ad placed by the Historical Society late last fall brought several responses including one from a visiting Danville-area native, Billie McCaw, and her husband Bill, who examined the tired, but proud, house. Realizing its potential, they purchased the property from the Society a year ago late this month. Restoration of the house by the McCaws, who operate a professional photography studio in Silver Spring, Maryland, began in earnest in March of this year, and the rapid, visible progress since that time has been truly phenomenal. The foundation and sills have been thoroughly repaired, including the replacement of several sections of twelve-inch sill beams. The once-sagging porch has been completely rebuilt, and all windows repaired so that both sashes of these double-hung windows are fully operable. All the clapboarding was stripped of remaining paint, then primed with linseed oil, primer, and painted with oil-based paint in an authentic three-color Victorian scheme of light chocolate siding, buff yellow trim and New England red sash and accents. An earth-toned shingled roof has been installed so as to harmonize with the colors of the house, and even the formerly truncated chimney has been rebuilt to its former soaring height.

Inside, the McCaws have completely updated the infrastructure of the period house with new wiring, plumbing, wall and attic insulation, and other necessities for modern living. None of the charm of the original rooms has been removed in the process. All the handsome 1896 moldings, mantels, pocket doors, the two staircases, and tall Victorian era ceilings have been retained. Mr. and Mrs. McCaw are now completing their selection of appropriate colors, wallpapers, and fabric, giving care to decoration that is true to the late Victorian era. When the house is sufficiently complete, the McCaws and their two young daughters will be leaving Maryland for their house in a block that is the gateway to Danville's Historic District.

Tour Book 1990:

Saved from the wrecking ball in 1986 by an ad hoc committee of the Society, this shining example of Victoriana has been decked out in authentic period colors by its current owners. Built as one of a pair of identical speculative houses by C. C. Dula, a prominent tobacconist, in 1896, it was the first home of Barnes R. Penn, his wife the former Mary Katherine Penn, and their daughter, Elizabeth, who resided here while building the Queen Anne home across the street at 1020 Main St. For many years the property was home to the R. A. Arrington family, then to Mr. and Mrs. E. F. Scales. From the 1940's to the 1970's, it was the residence of the Robert E. Turner family. Vacant and in dire need of repair from neglect, it was purchased at auction by Hope Harbor, next door, which planned to demolish the property for a parking lot.

Society volunteers and the donations from many area businesses rehabilitated the structure enough to attract a response to a single advertisement from the McCaws, who were living and operating a professional photography studio in Silver Spring, Maryland. Billie McCaw is a native of Chatham. The once dilapidated porch has been rebuilt, the windows were completely repaired, and after stripping the clapboard, the home has been painted in a three-colored scheme of light chocolate siding, buff trim, and New England red accents.

After updating the infrastructure in a labor of love, the McCaw family has installed an authentic tin ceiling in the kitchen, period wallpaper, and hand- painted a ceiling medallion in the dining room. An earth-toned shingle roof has been installed to harmonize with the striking color scheme of the house. All the handsome 1896 moldings, mantels, pocket doors, front and back staircases, and tall Victorian ceilings have been retained.

Serving as their private residence, the home also operates as an attractive bed & breakfast inn, which advertises as a "timeless experience of the gaslight era.- The parlor bedroom features a Renaissance Revival bed and a period keyboard musical instrument. The lodging guests enjoy the clawfoot tub, elegant Victorian furnishings, "gingerbread" deck overlooking the backyard, and a screened porch with a jacuzzi spa. The McCaws are now renovating to Victorian charm a commercial space for Fine Art Photography in the 1921 Masonic Temple. Their dedication to the restoration of the Dula-Penn home is a tribute to historic preservation in a block that is the southern gateway to Danville's Historic District.

Tour Book 2004:

Blessed with caring new owners who moved in last spring, this splendid house also stands as testimony to the couple who restored it over 15 years ago, and to its pioneering rescue from demolition by the Danville Historical Society.

Even today, the house retains its original Queen Anne form from 1896, when it was one of a pair of nearly identical side-hall houses built as "spec" by one of Danville's tobacconist near-millionaires, C.E. Dula. Early in the 20th century 1031 Main Street became the residence of newlyweds Barnes and Mary Katherine Penn during construction of their new dwelling across the street, 1020 Main Street, completed in June 1903 by Mrs. Penn's parents as a wedding gift for the couple.

For a number of years the property was home first to the R.A. Arrington family, then to Mr. and Mrs. E.F. Scales. With Miss Pearl Morrisette, Mrs. (Bessie) Scales was a recorder of folk history

in the Danville area for the Federal Writers Project, part of President Roosevelt's Depression-era effort to put America back to work. From the 1940s and into the 1970s the house was the residence of the Robert E. Turner family.

In the summer of 1986 when preservationists became aware of the imminent demolition of the house, an ad-hoc committee of the Danville Historical Society mobilized to stabilize what was then a neglected eyesore.

Just one classified ad attracted a couple from Silver Spring, Maryland, willing to tackle the massive restoration project. Bill and Billie McCaw spent the next two years practically rebuilding the structure -- replacing rotted sill beams, making the original double-hung windows fully operable and completely stripping and then repainting the exterior in warm earth tones appropriate to the period. They also paid particular attention to preserving and enhancing the late Victorian character of the interior.

The talent and professionalism of Cyndee Perdue-Moore and husband Jeff Moore is evident as these new owners bring renewed life to the structure. Their adaptation of the ground floor as a gathering place for family and friends is a delightful twist in this otherwise traditional, but comfortable, dwelling from the Victorian era.

Tour Book 2017:

Saved from the wrecking ball in 1986, this shining example of Victoriana is decked out in authentic period colors. One of a pair of identical "spec" houses buil in 1896 for a prominent tobacconist, C. C. Dula, it became home to newlywed cousins, Barnes Penn and the former Mary Katherine Penn. From their temporary residence, they watched as their lavish new dwelling rose across the street at 1020 Main, completed in 1903 by Mrs. Penn's parents as a wedding gift for the couple.

More than 80 years on, when preservationists became aware of the imminent demolition of the house, an ad-hoc committee of the Danville Historical Society mobilized to stabilize what was by then a neglected eyesore. Responding to a single classified ad, a Maryland couple, Bill and Billie McCaw, practically rebuilt the place over the next two years – with great attention to detail that preserved and enhanced its American Picturesque character inside and out.

Since 2003, when Jeff Moore and his wife Dr. Cyndee Perdue Moore purchased the Queen Anne house, they have continued its rehabilitation, rejuvenating its three-color exterior scheme among many other improvements. Jeff has transformed the unused basement into a delightful gathering space, "recreating" Danville's Main Street throuthout, complete with a telephone booth and facades from the local firehouse and other historic downtown businesses. The Moores have filled all three floors with work by local artists, set against the rich backdrop of original period details.

Tour Book 2014:

Echoes of the rich legacy of Stratford College, which closed 40 years ago, continue today on the former campus with Stratford House, a not-for-profit retirement community serving Danville, and well beyond, for nearly a quarter century.

Dominated by a three-and-a-half-story tower with a French Renaissance-style square dome, the front portion of "Old Main," with its monumental porch, commands attention as the signature of Stratford House, just as it did for the college beginning in 1883. It remains a vital survivor to an important architectural grouping at the head of Main Street.

Long a bastion of liberal arts education for women, Stratford traced its roots to antebellum Danville with the Danville Female College (1854). When, in 1883, it moved to the location across from Mt. Vernon Methodist Church then under construction, the Methodist-aligned school became the Danville College for Young Ladies. Trustees hired the noted Richmond architect Albert West to design the new academic building. T.B. Fitzgerald, contractor for many local landmarks, including nearby Mt. Vernon Church, oversaw construction of the T-shaped building. In 1910 the school, known at the time as Randolph-Macon Institute, replaced the early porch

with the present massive two-story portico with square Doric columns and balustrade, a design by Lynchburg architect Stanhope Johnson. Beginning in 1930 and until 1974, when this all-women's four-year institution closed due to declining enrollment and mounting debt, the school was known as Stratford College.

Thereafter, Danville's Memorial Hospital, long a neighbor of Stratford, acquired the property when it assumed the school's indebtedness. Using remnants of the old campus facing Main Street as its focus - the front of Old Main, plus Kennedy Hall - the hospital launched Stratford House in the late 1980s.

The facility opened as Danville's first-ever independent living community in 1990, with assisted living available the following year.

The tour includes a special Stratford College exhibit from the Danville Historical Society'a Stratford Collection, plus other public rooms in the new buildings just behind historic Old Main. There, the tour highlights original parlors with lofty ceilings and handsome mantels, staircases, and other richly ornamental spaces glittering in holiday splendor.

Each of three Schoolfield brothers -- John, James, and Addison -- built homes on Main Street, a measure of the prosperity they fostered locally when in 1882 they founded the textile mills that became Dan River, Inc. The house at 1124 Main Street was the last of the three to be built, in 1911 for the youngest brother, Robert Addison Schoolfield. A native of Henry County, Virginia

like his brothers, Ad Schoolfield first observed Southern textile operations while recovering from a lengthy illness in Columbus, Georgia. Upon his return to Virginia, he persuaded his brothers in Danville to begin the textile venture that continues to flourish over a century later. He was Dan River's first secretary-treasurer and later became its president -- a powerful and energetic promoter of the industry until his death in 1931.

Following his marriage to Annie Redd France in 1885, he acquired from E.B. Withers a lot near where Main and South Main Streets merge and had a house built in 1890. This first house, a brick Victorian structure with a corner tower, was replaced in 1910-11 by the present massive stucco-over-solid-brick dwelling. Designed by Charles Pettit of McLaughlin, Pettit and Johnson, of Danville and Lynchburg, Schoolfield's second residence has vaguely Chinese or Spanish details, but its horizontal lines and broad projecting eaves ally it with the midwest Prairie School designs of Frank Lloyd Wright.

Until recent years the house remained the residence of a Schoolfield daughter, Bland Schoolfield Church, who survived her husband Howard Church by many years before her death in 1976. When plans to convert the house to a residence for adults (to be endowed by Mrs. Church) proved unfeasible, the property was sold to Dr. and Mrs. B.R. Ashby.

The owners and their three young daughters make full use of the house, which also provides office space for Dr. Ashby's medical practice. The interior, now beautifully refurbished throughout, is noted for its spaciousness and fine proportion, its exceptional Classical Revival details in decided contrast to the non-classical exterior. Original interior finishing materials are of the highest quality -- cypress window frames, solid mahogany pocket doors, parquet floor, fireboxes surrounded by Italian marble, and dining room walls that retain their original fresco paintings. In addition to the antiques and accessories the owners have collected, the Ashbys also inherited a portrait of Ad Schoolfield, now hanging in the hall, that Mrs. Church specified in her will remain in the house.

In just over a century, only two families have occupied this distinctive mansion at the head of Main Street. Its origins reflect the exuberant prosperity of Danville's early 20th century textile boom.

Each of the three Schoolfield brothers - John, James and Robert Addison (Ad) - who founded the textile mills that became Dan River Inc., built homes on Main Street. The house at 1124 Main Street was the last of the trio - built for Ad Schoolfield, the youngest brother who first became intrigued with the potential for Southern textiles while recovering from a long illness in Columbus, Georgia. Upon his return home, Ad Schoolfield enlisted his brothers and three more investors to launch a mill that expanded into the textile powerhouse that flourished in Danville for 125 years. As Dan River's first secretary-treasurer, and later its president, he became an industry leader until his death in 1931.

Ad Schoolfield acquired the lot where this house eventually was built from E.B. Withers, not long after marrying Annie Redd France in 1885. Here in 1890, facing the "triangle" where Main

Street forks to become South and West Main, his contractors built a tall, narrow red-brick Victorian house with a corner tower.

As Schoolfield's fortunes rose, he replaced this first house with the present massive stucco-over-brick dwelling in 1910-11. Designed by Charles Pettit of McLaughlin, Pettit and Johnson, of Danville and Lynchburg, Schoolfield's second residence sports vaguely Spanish (or even Chinese) details, but its horizontal lines and broad projecting eaves ally it with the Prairie School designs of Frank Lloyd Wright.

The house sheltered members of the Schoolfield family for some 65 years - descending last to a daughter, Bland Schoolfield Church. When, following her death in 1976, Mrs. Church's plans to convert her former home to a residence for adults proved unfeasible, the property was sold to Dr. and Mrs. B.R. Ashby.

Before Dr. Ashby's death last year, he and his wife and daughters made this house not only a comfortable family home for some 35 years, but also adapted some of its handsome square-footage as office space for Dr. Ashby's medical practice. Beautifully refurbished, the interior, especially, is noted for its spaciousness and fine proportion, with exceptional Classical Revival details in decided contrast to the Foursquare exterior. Original fittings and finishes are highest quality - cypress window frames, solid mahogany pocket doors, parquet floors, fireboxes surrounded by Italian marble, and a dining room with a coffered ceiling and the original fresco paintings. In addition to antiques and accessories the owners collected, they also "inherited" a portrait of Ad Schoolfield that Mrs. Church specified in her will remain with the house.
